White Pine Chapter 2007 Forthcoming Events:

Saturday, July 14: Chapter Field Trip/Workshop

Little North Fork of the Clearwater

Led by Fred Rabe and Pam Brunsfeld

Carpool 6:00 a.m., Rosauer's parking lot, rtn. by 5:30 p.m.

We will study the natural history of Little North Fork Clearwater (LNFC) country. The purpose is to enjoy LNFC as an outdoor laboratory. We will sample plants and invertebrates at Pinchot Marsh and LNFC River. Interest in educational values of the area should help persuade BLM and the Forest Service to protect these sites as Research Natural Areas. The workshop can accomodate 20 people, which includes three or four resource folks. Please no pets. The trip takes about 3 hours. We drive to Clarkia, Idaho then northeast on Road 321 to the St. Joe River; turn right then right again on West Fork Fishhook Creek Road to Breezy Saddle about 20 miles south of Avery, Idaho. From there we'll drive down to the river to collect samples, then gather more at the marsh. NOTE that this has changed from a two-day to a one-day trip. There are two primitive camparounds in the area for those wishing to stay overnight. A map of key resources, roads and trails of the area will be made available as well as handouts. Annual Meeting of the Idaho Native Plant Society held June 14-16 at Craters of the Moon National Monument by Nancy Miller

The Stages and the Millers arrived at Craters of the Moon within minutes of each other – no amount of planning could have achieved that! We and others were soon setting up in the group campground which was a mile or so away from the main campground. Others set up in the main campground or stayed in Arco. The group campground was in sagerabbit brush-bitterbrush habitat with nearby areas of fine cinder. Buckwheat was a predominant bloom – the list said 28 varieties – and we certainly found many varieties from large sulphur colored balls on 20" plants to 1/2" tall silver-leaved buckwheat with pinkish blooms barely above the leaves. The latter were located in the cinder flats along with beautiful Lewisia with 1-1/2" pinkish-whitish blooms and large red buds. Brewers' sparrows trilled from the sage, poorwills announced themselves at night, brilliant blue bluebirds hovered over the sage and landed on the black cinder.

Paul McDaniel and graduate student **Karen Vaughan** from UI led a field trip on the lava beds on Saturday morning. They explained the organic soil formation – with wind blown minerals first finding a niche in the lava, then seeds being deposited. The resulting plants grow, decompose, and combine with wind blown minerals to gradually form an organic soil for later plants. The group walked out on paths and learned the difference between pahoehoe lava and a'a lava. They were able to visit several lava caves and tubes. There was lots of time for botanizing as well.

In the afternoon there was a field trip to a nearby area off the monument. We walked partly on Goodall's cutoff – an emigrant trail which skirted the lava beds. Many plants were identified in this area, and the group also enjoyed watching a pair of Lewis' woodpeckers in the aspen groves.

In the evening there was a potluck at the group campground (about 50 in attendance) and a presentation by a local historian on the Oregon Trail. Sunday morning there was a state INPS board meeting at the monument office. Most campers headed off for home or other explorations.

INPS White Pine Chapter was well represented at the Craters annual meeting by the Millers, Stages, McDaniel/Lichthardt (including Natalie), Sarah Walker, Bill Phillips, and Marilyn Olson.

Our warmest thanks go to: Brenda Guettler, Jerry Cebula and Terry Gray for leading the field trip to Craig Mountain on June 9; Jacie and Wayne Jensen for the tours of their Paradise Ridge property on May 31 and June 5, also thanks to Brenda Guettler and Dave Skinner for their expert advice and help in identifying plants on both days; Gerry and Elaine Queener for inviting us to their property to see native plants on May 19; Juanita Lichthardt and Janice Hill for their presentation on May 16 on the flora of Craig Mountain; Al and Marjorie Stage for taking us on a beautiful spring walk on their property on April 28; and Jerry Rehfledt for broadening our understanding of how global warming will impact our ecosystems in his presentation on April 12.
