Western redcedar is a culturally, ecologically and economically important tree to the Pacific Northwest, but recent increases in dieback have raised concern about its vulnerability to hotter and dryer climates. INPS members and friends can help address the urgent need for information as community scientists in the Forest Health Watch program. More observations are particularly needed in the inland Northwest!
